Shasta Lodge Golf



And the peace of God, which passeth all understanding, shall keep your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus.




All of our helpers will need to park next door in the 49ers parking lot. We will have a workers dinner each day at 4PM until 5PM.



DID YOU KNOW?? Espresso, Cappuccino, and Italian Coffee Culture

Italians are so passionate about espresso, you'd think they discovered it. But what they have done is created a coffee culture, with their own ways of



serving and enjoying the brew, that's unparalleled anywhere in the world.

Coffee houses were first established in Constantinople (modernday Istanbul) in the 15th century, but their popularity was limited at first because Islamic preachers considered the stimulating liquid as sinful as alcohol. By the time it was accepted in Turkey, coffee had entered Italy through Venice in the 16th century and created an immediate sensation. At first it became a luxury item as its supply was limited but as coffee plantations became established in European colonies in South America, the price decreased and coffee gradually went from part of the upper classes to the culture of all Italians. From Venice across the north to Verona, then Milan and Turin, and finally to Rome and all the way to Sicily, elegant coffeehouses were built, some of which still operate today.

In Italy the coffee culture is about the essence of the uniquely Italian cappuccino and espresso, and there are differences to how Italian coffee is drunk and served. Cappuccino has been called the "Breakfast of Italians." Milk is almost a meal in itself, so having a cappuccino at a bar in the morning requires no other food, especially since the body absorbs lactose from milk, which is a sugar, and that guick release of carbohydrate energy along with the caffeine kick is all you need to wake up: for something more, one might add a small pastry but not necessarily. It's sensible science, but the real reason for the custom is that Italians believe drinking milk after ANY meal will mess up your ability to digest food properly. That means having a cappuccino anytime after lunch or dinner is incomprehensible. It would be hard to find a restaurant that serves cappuccino after dinner and if you order it after 11 am, while you will probably be graciously accommodated, you might as well be wearing a "tourist" sign around your neck.

The true go-to anytime-pick-me-up in Italy is an espresso, although one never asks for it by name: one simply requests "un caffe." We assume espresso has far more caffeine than regular American-style brewed coffee. This is both true and false: true, because espresso is highly concentrated, but false because a shot, even a *doppio*, is far less volume than a cup of regular coffee. So, an after-dinner espresso might keep you up at night, but not as much as you think which is good because in Italy decaf is hard to find, as it defeats that pick-me-up purpose of "un caffe."

Finally, while flavoring and sugaring up coffee is definitely an American thing, there are a few regional specialties: in the North, there's Cappuccino Viennese, which has chocolate and cinnamon, and in the Marche region the aniseed-flavored espresso Caffe Anisette. And there is one Italian variety called *Caffe Corretto*, literally "corrected coffee: you will be served espresso with its "correction," always something boozy like a shot of grappa, Sambuca, or brandy. The two arrive separately, allowing the drinkers to "correct" the coffee their own way and upend the alcohol into their demitasse slugs in one or two sips with a "Salute!" Perhaps it was inevitable that the "stimulating liquids" of Italy would meet.

National Leadership Grant Competition

General Eligibility: U.S. citizens of Italian descent (at least one Italian or Italian-American grandparent) enrolled in a four year undergraduate program or a graduate program at an accredited academic institution for the Fall 2019 term. *Previous SIF scholarship winners are not eligible. Additional eligibility requirements may apply to specific scholarships.*

General Requirements: *Please see each scholarship description for its specific requirements*. The following general requirements apply to all scholarships (except where noted):

Application Form: Must be submitted along with requirements for each scholarship.

Transcripts: For each scholarship, transcripts provided must be through the **December 2018** term. All transcripts must be stamped by the institution.

Processing Fee: A \$35 non-refundable processing fee is required with each scholarship application. The fee includes a **one-year At** -Large Membership to OSDIA, with all At-Large Membership benefits.

Deadline: The deadline for all scholarships (unless otherwise noted) is **February 28, 2019**. All requirements for a given scholarship must be met or the application will not be considered. All scholarship materials must be submitted online, and completed applications must be submitted by February 28, 2019. <u>No exceptions will be made. The SIF takes no responsibility for incomplete or late applications</u>.

Process: Applications are screened by education professionals. Final selection is made by OSDIA's National Scholarship, Education and Culture Committee. Scholarship recipients will be notified by May 1, 2019 Monetary awards are presented directly to the students'

Available Scholarships

General Study Scholarships: A number of General Study Scholarships are available. Only one application is required to be eligible for all General Study Scholarships. U.S. citizens of Italian descent enrolled in a four-year undergraduate program or a graduate program at an accredited academic institution for the Fall 2019 term are eligible for general study scholarships.

Henry Salvatori Scholarship: U.S. citizens of Italian descent in their senior year of high school and planning to attend an undergraduate program at a four-year, accredited academic institution for the Fall 2019 term are eligible for this scholarship.

Italian Language Scholarship: U.S. citizens of Italian descent in their junior or senior year of undergraduate study for the Fall 2019 term, majoring or minoring in Italian language studies at an accredited academic institution are eligible to apply.

National Italian American Bar Association (NIABA) & Sons of Italy Foundation[®]Scholarship: U.S. citizens of Italian descent enrolled in a law school program at an accredited academic institution for the Fall 2019 term, and are a rising first, second or third year law student are eligible.

The American University of Rome Study Abroad Scholarship: The American University in Rome (AUR) scholarship is for studying abroad at its campus in Rome, Italy. The recipient will attend as a full-time matriculating student. U.S. citizens of Italian descent enrolled in a four-year undergraduate or graduate program at an accredited academic institution for the Fall 2019 term.
