## Spring City Bocce Leagues


We are now in the process of making up games due to being rained out four weeks. Please contact your team captain to let them know when you are available to play.

A time to tear apart and a time to sew together; A time to be silent and a time to speak.


A time to love and a time to hate; A time for war and <u>a time</u> for peace.

#### My Dad, Al Massa

My dad's life began in a time period we find unrecognizable. In 1916, when my father was born in Breezy Hill, Kansas, babies often died as infants, children died of typhoid fever from drinking water on school outings and young fathers died of pneumonia. These were the days when an orange was a Christmas present, and toys were made from scraps found in someone else's debris pile. I know this because these details were in the stories my dad told me about his childhood.

My dad's father, an immigrant coal miner, died of pneumonia when Dad was 3, leaving behind Dad, his two brothers, and an expectant wife. Attempting to provide for her family, his mother–a seamstress–remarried 2 times and finally resettled in Chicago, Illinois, in 1927. These years were difficult. In 1928, his mother married Leo Kaiser, a carpenter and woodworker. Pa Kaiser was a good man who treated my dad as his own son.

During the depression, Dad left school after 10<sup>th</sup> grade and joined the CCCs–Civilian Conservation Corps–and went to Idaho. Here he began to seek after God and was baptized in a small, rural Catholic church in Pierce, Idaho while stationed at a camp nearby, on the Green River. He and other young men worked at removing diseased trees, clearing brush and making trails in the national forest.. Returning to <u>Chicago</u> in 1934, he worked in a tannery and an auto shop before enlisting in the army in 1937 where his first post was in Monterey, California, in the 11<sup>th</sup> Calvary, A Troop as soldier 44. His favorite horse was Virgo. During this time he was one of the soldiers in the movie Seargent Murphy with Ronald Reagan.

After 3 years Dad returned to Chicago where he met a blue-eyed Italian beauty named Angela Serafini and eloped with her. He reenlisted and was sent to Texas. In 1942. Dad and Mom moved around the world together. They lived in Georgia, Texas, Indiana, Maryland, Illinois, California, Japan and Germany. While fighting in WWII Dad was shot in the ankle and was awarded the Purple Heart. He later served in Korea. During his time in the Army he was part of the cavalry, worked as a cook, earned honors shooting with many cadre units, ran various motor pools in Georgia, Japan, and Germany, and taught automotive repair to service men and then to students at the prestigious Culver Military Academy. After 27 years of serving his country he retired from the military in 1965.

Dad moved us to California in 1968 where he worked at Shasta Dam as a guard and mechanic before retiring in 1978. During his time at Shasta Dam, he started the tradition of a Shasta Dam Thanksgiving meal for all of the employees, a tradition which continues today.

My dad spent his retirement having coffee at McDonalds every morning at 5:30 with a group of his buddies and serving others. With the Knights of Columbus, he cooked Sunday fund-raising breakfasts and started a Christmas Day Dinner for anyone in need of a warm meal and company, a tradition which still continues. As a member of the Sons of Italy, he cooked many fundraising meals and helped provide education on Italian heritage with his friend Historian Frank Rose. With his group of buddies, he helped widows with home maintenance, provided wheel chairs and other medical equipment free of charge to those in need, and generally kept everyone entertained with his jokes.

"How are you feeling, AI?" "With my fingers."

Even the hospice nurse knew to expect a joke. He left a legacy of 4 children, 13 grandchildren, 7 greatgrandchildren, and friends literally everywhere he went, because if he did not have a friend when he arrived somewhere, he had made one by the time he left. They all remember him for his jokes, his constant positive energy, his ability to figure out how things work and how to fix them, and his love of helping others. At 102, when he left his life, he left the world better than he found it.

My children, our love should not be just words and talk; it

must be true love, which shows itself in action/ (1 John 3:18)





#### THE QUEST

EVERYONE HAS A STORY. For our family, it is the story of immigration and assimilation. A story which involves a quest to discover how we got here, and what happened before to make us who we are now.

A QUEST IS ALL ABOUT SEEKING SOMETHING IMPORTANT, AND IT OFTEN INVOLVES A JOURNEY.

Researching our family heritage can be an all-consuming challenge. If we had only asked questions of our parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles; if only.

When the time finally arrives, when something deep inside demands that we uncover who these people were and where we all came from, our sources are all too often unavailable to us. For some families that have remained intact, knowing all their generations of cousins, etcetera, the questions aren't as daunting.

For some families, like ours, familial history may be spread across continents, cultures, languages, and great expanses of time, the proverbial quest to answer these questions and connect with others of our same last names can seem insurmountable.

My Mother-In-Law, 'Ethel' (Euphemia), had two sisters that married two Lucchetti brothers who immigrated to America from Italy around the late 1800's and early 1900's. They lived and worked on ranches in Sonoma and Mendocino Counties. My Father's parents, who was also a Lucchetti, had immigrated to San Francisco around the same time.

Nonno was the foreman at the Buri Buri Ranch, a large vegetable farm in Colma, South of San Francisco, and eventually they settled in Mountain View. They were all farmers to the core.

In the May issue of "IL LEONE," under 'Sponsors,' there were two individuals who shared the same last name as my Mother-In-Law's maiden name, Pardini. It occurred to me that our extended Italian family couldn't be the only ones seeking information about others that we could be related to, and even from the same obscure places in Italy.

To my way of thinking, my Husband's cousins were my cousins, and not just because of our marriage. Somewhere, deep down I "just knew" that we were truly from the same place and they were connected to my grandparents.

In 1975 I told Nonna that we were planning a trip to Varese and Cavizzano. She was in disbelief and said, "No, no one has ever gone back."

I recently started planning to return to Varese Ligure, La Spezia, and specifically Cavizzano where Nonna was born and raised. But the idea that I needed to know for certain that these two families were indeed one was overwhelming. The quest was on!

As in any good story, there were tangible clues--scrawled notes taken down over 50 years ago. When talking to my Nonna, or Auntie Julia, or my Mother-In-Law and Father-In-Law, there was concrete evidence, and all I had to do was unscramble the hieroglyphics--the meaning of the diagram, our extended family tree, which I had been told was the key to connecting the two Lucchetti families. It all had to do with the brothers; one, two, or three generations back. That was the challenge at the heart of my quest.

As of today, there is confirming documentation that our two families, for generations, came from the exact same place, Cavizzano (Campo), located several miles from Varese Ligure. They share most of the same names; Lucchetti, Figone, DeVincenzi, Gotelli, Ghiorzo, Biasotti, Leonardini, Pezzi, Picetti, Giannecchini, and Cavagnaro. The close-by towns/villages of Bedonia, Scurtabo, Cassego, Teviggio, and Carranza are also interlaced. According to one source, the Mayor of Varese is (or was) a Lucchetti.

Our story won't end by adding names, dates, places, and relationships to a chart, but rather will be documented in film by my nephew, Alan Lucchetti. Alan has been working in the film and television industry for nearly twenty years, both as an Emmy nominated photojournalist in TV news and as a documentary filmmaker. He has worked on eight documentary films, including one titled Our Story: Italian-Americans in Utah, which recounts the stories of the miners and railroad men, farmers and stone masons who came to live and work in Utah. It delves into Italian cooking and music, faith and family, and how the Italian culture was carried with these immigrants to America. https://www.deseretnews.com/article/700234157/Our-story--KUED-documentary-looks-at-Italian-Americans-in-Utah.html

Alan will interview the families here in Northern California, and if we are successful in locating my Mother-In-Law's Pardini and Giannecchini families in Pascoso, Pescaglia, near Lucca, and our now combined Lucchetti families in and near Cavizzano, Varese Ligure, La Spezia, Liguria, Italy, we will have made the connection not just on paper but with the faces, names, and voices of our families, the triumphs, struggles and sacrifices of our ancestors, to share with future generations.
